


We also knew she had a very dry wit and every so often would drop in little pearls of humour that would make you laugh out loud.

Richard's Flapjack

Many of us have been lucky to enjoy Richard's Flapjack over the years when we have visited the Old Vicarage at Ganton. Christine is submitting the recipe to the Recipe Book that D4 International Services are producing to be sold at the Harrogate Conference. With Richard and Christine's permission I am enclosing it here. It is written in Richard's own hand so you can tell how authentic it is. It is not just any flapjack-it is Richard Gretton's Flapjack!

FLAP JACK Don't avercook - it will go hand. 170 gm Brown Sugar 90 gm Treacle SYRUP/BLACK 50/50 130 gm Butter 300 gm Scott, Porridge Oats (origend) 50 gm Self Raising Flow 1 tbs water 1 tep Vanilla paste. 60 30 gm chopped dried Fruit Pour Builing Water on four Dates - Apricots - Rasins) & drawin after 1 min Melt Butter sugar treache in a large pan adding Vanilla & water when meltedstir & combine. Do not overheat. Mise Dats - flour & dried fruit in a bowl & add to pan - Combine all until dry mise is covered with malted. line a 300 × 200 baking tray with non stick foil - add contents of pan & flatten out (about 2 cm thick) Cook approx 30 min @ 160°C with light brown Cool & chop into 50 mm squares.

Wild Ocean Farming

Lynda organised a visit to the Seagrown ship but unfortunately because of inclement weather we had to meet at the Sea Cadet's HQ. We heard all about the science behind the technology. It was a very good illustrated talk.

CARBON SEQUESTRATION

Seaweed is a powerhouse of carbon capture, absorbing CO2 from the atmosphere and helping to mitigate climate change. If seaweed was grown over 9% of the ocean it would take up all of the carbon that has been emitted by humankind.

OCEAN REGENÉRATION

Seaweed farms act as underwater forests, producing oxygen and providing habitat for marine animals including juvenile fish and shellfish. Overall seaweed farming can enhance marine biodiversity and increase ocean health.

SUSTAINABLE RESOURCE

Seaweed is a rapidly growing renewable resource. It requires no fertilizers, pesticides, or freshwater, making it a highly sustainable crop. It provides a low carbon and versatile food and seaweed can be used to replace high carbon inputs into products such as plastics, fertilisers and fuels.

REDUCING COASTAL PRESSURE

By moving seaweed cultivation offshore, SeaGrown eases pressure on the use of coastal areas, which can be reserved for recreation, tourism, and near-shore fishing.

NUTRIENT ABSORBTION

Seaweed absorbs excess nutrients like nitrogen and phosphorus. In the right place this can help combat pollution from agricultural runoff, reducing harmful algal blooms that can devastate marine environments.
