

## Ro's Recipe



### Ingredients

200g (7oz) Butter  
60g (2.5oz) Onions (finely chopped)  
50g (2oz) Cream cheese (full fat)  
250g (9oz) Porridge oats  
75g (3oz) Self-raising flour  
1 Egg (whisked)  
Salt & Pepper  
50g (2oz) Cranberries  
50g (2oz) Chopped nuts  
small piece Red Leicester or coloured Cheddar for grating

### Method

1. Preheat the oven to 180°/gas mark 4. Lightly grease a Swiss roll tin 30cm x 23cm
2. Use a little of the butter to fry the onions then add the rest of the butter to melt in the pan
3. Stir in cream cheese until blended
4. Remove pan from heat and mix in oats, flour, egg, s&p, cranberries and chopped nuts.
5. Turn the mixture into the tin and spread evenly.  
Grate cheese over the top.
6. Bake for 20 minutes until golden brown. Cool in the tin for 10 mins before cutting into 24 slices.  
Finish cooling on a wire rack. Store in the 'fridge.



## Summer Smash!


